We urge you to continue the Roadless Rule protection of our old-growth forest in Southeast Alaska.

The Roadless Rule protects 9.3 million acres of breathtaking, undeveloped roadless land in the Tongass. If the Trump administration moves forward with its plan to dismantle the Roadless Rule in the Tongass, it will endanger much of the old-growth temperate rainforest remaining on Earth.

It will also destroy the only habitat the the rare Alexander Archipelago wolves have. Despite this, Alaska Department of Fish and Game will allow hunters to hunt and trap 20% of the Alexander Archipelago wolves on Prince of Wales Island while U.S. Department of Agriculture is working hard to undermine safeguards for the Tongass's centuries-old trees - the only home for these wolves and their prey. The Trump administration has just launched a plan that remove Roadless Rule protections for the Tongass National Forest in Southeast Alaska. This plan puts all our forests at risk.
