The Alaska Roadless Rule must be left in place and not altered to allow for expensive and damaging road building that would be put in place to allow expanded logging of forest lands. Salmon runs provide a valuable source of quality protein and, along with steelhead, support a valuable recreational fishery that provides jobs and income for Alaskans. There are few areas left in the world, let alone our United States, with this critically important habitat. Salmon and steelhead runs are in serious decline in the Lower 48, so the Alaskan habitat increased in importance with each passing day.
